

Establishing new and strengthening existing **partnerships** with the public sector, private sector, financial institutions, and UN agencies to identify areas of food procurement synergies.








WFP Uganda Food Procurement

Over the past 8 years
 WFP purchased 744,000
 MT of food* from
 Uganda.

 This injected 290 Million USD into the national economy.

In 2023 alone, WFP
 Uganda purchased
 75,000 MT injecting
 nearly 44 Million USD
 into Uganda.

WFP Uganda - Post Harvest Management

Challenges

- Poor Post-Harvest Management is a major impediment to growth in Uganda's agricultural sector
- Post-Harvest Losses negatively impacts the economy, nutrition, environment, farmer livelihoods, food security and nutrition (NDPIII)
- Losses are due to poor practices involving spillage, spoilage and grain deterioration.
- Lack of appropriate and feasible technologies



WFP Uganda - Post Harvest Management

Solutions

- Addressing post-harvest management can transform the lives of low-income farmers.
- Training in postharvest management provided to over 100,000 Ugandan farmers.
- Adoption of improved technologies (silos, hermetic bags, shellers, threshers, chippers etc).
- Access to community storage facilities (73 satellite collection points)
- 315 schools (in the school feeding programme) received over 3,000 hermetic grain storage silos.





WFP calls for the engagement of all players: Governments, producers, traders, private sector players including processors and manufacturers, academia, financial institutions etc.

We need **strong partnerships** in this journey to achieving **zero hunger** whilst achieving sustainable social and economic **transformation** within our region.
